


The Food Bank Garden is under way with the seeds and transplants (started in the greenhouse) now planted. The Knights of Columbus of Immaculate Conception Roman Catholic Church and the Old Barns United Church Men's Club are preparing this garden of vegetables and fruit for the Colchester County Food Bank.

We typically do our weeding and harvesting on Monday mornings, and Wednesday mornings, at 9 am. We deliver produce the same morning to the Food Bank, which is open three days a week. We plan to have a garden time one evening a week for those who are working during the day.

This year, the garden is again located at the home of John and Mary Heukshorst, 1766 highway 236, in Beaver Brook, just 10 minutes from town. It will be a smaller garden to match the Human Resources available.

Garden volunteers will be updated by email early each week, telling of garden progress and listing the chores for the coming week. We watch the weather, and on rainy days, we rest!

A Circle of Stones: A Matriarch's Life Journey by Betty Radford Turcott








Clay Pots and Bones

Water of Life

Jim Gehrels was a hydro geologist, specializing in water quality issues. In 1995, he travelled to Liberia with Lifewater Int'I., an organization that installed simple wells and taught the villagers how to use them. He and his wife Lynda were deeply disturbed by the large number of Liberian children who were dying due to contaminated water. They created Lifewater Canada and began drilling more wells in Liberia.

Each well, with training and ongoing assistance, could be installed for \$3,000.00 and could provide water for about 600 people for one dollar each for a year. (The cost is \$4,000.00 now). The number of people supported per well dropped to 500, and they are at 420 now, and working towards lowering that to 300.

It takes over forty pumps of the handle to fill a five- gallon pail, and each family needs about three pails. Multiply that by 420 people using that well. They need a lot of money for repairs and upkeep.

From July 1, 2023 to April 1, 2024, they completed 4,473 projects, which benefitted 1½ million people. This fiscal year they expect to complete 6000 projects. These wells don't only provide safe drinking water. They provide safety to girls and women, due to the shorter travel distance, and provide time for the girls to attend school.

The improved sanitation means better health due to reduced illness. Food security and cleanliness is much improved.

Placide Chaisson was also deeply concerned about the water situation and started Water of Life in our local area twenty years ago, reaching out to a very few churches and schools. Over the years there has been increasing interest. Most churches and schools have become involved, some occasionally, while others have supported Water of Life every year.

There have been many projects undertaken, and to date, twelve schools and seven (sometimes more) churches have completed 54 projects (43 wells, 11 pump repairs, or health and hygiene), supporting over 20,000 people in about 40 communities, and raising about \$130,000.00.

Placide has been working very hard, especially this last year and a half and has kept us inspired. The Committee's "dream goal" to celebrate Water of Life's 20th year is to raise \$20,000.00. We would be delighted to reach \$10,000.00. As of June 10th, the total is over \$11,000.00!! with some donations yet to come.


Thank you to everyone who was involved in any way with this Water of Life project. We all raise our glasses of clean, uncontaminated water in a toast.
